Re: Executive Director's Report

Good morning, and welcome to Sacramento!

The CAC staff have been engaged in a period of high-paced planning and implementation on multiple fronts:

In March,

- We presented the 2024 Poetry Out Loud Competition;
- Prepared and released the guidelines for our 2024 funding opportunities; and
- Relaunched ArtBeat and activated our social media channels with new energy.

We have been working closely with our consultants, Institute for the Future, on the Creative Economy Workgroup. Our first public meeting is slated to take place on May 17th in Los Angeles.

This week represents a culmination of planning and co-creation:

- We convened 54 State and Local Partners, along with several of their board and staff
 members. The convening focused on advancing racial equity in California and building a
 strong and sustainable network of partners in every county in the state.
- Participated in the 2nd Annual Arts Summit presented by Californians for the Arts. The CAC had a wonderful presence at the event. We had a booth where attendees could stop by and meet the CAC staff and Megan Morgan presented on our Decision Support Tool to a packed house.
- On Tuesday the CAC's Budget was heard by the Assembly Budget Committee. Ayanna and I presented on the important work of the CAC and defended our budget.
- We've reached a 100% fully staffed agency. Onboarding and workflows are being strengthened through our ways of working.

Most recently we are exploring the growing practice of integrating arts and health - including mental health.

As we look toward the future, we are actively monitoring and responding to requests by DOF and Legislative Offices. These requests are timely and come with little notice.

Over the next three months, our focus will be:

- Engaging the field through providing technical assistance;
- Training and convening Panels;
- Ranking and Ordering for the Consideration of Council purview of allocations; and
- Supporting each Committee to fulfill its goals.

Finally, we are following up on our commitment to serving Native American and Indigenous artists by seeking to hire a consultant to develop a grant program that is specifically designed to serve this sector. We are engaged in the preplanning now, taking recommendations from the great work of the equity committee. We will report out on our progress at the August meeting.

The CAC is a catalytic agency. Partnerships with the field and with other state agencies such as the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and State Parks, are two great examples.

As we have heard from Megan Van Voorhis, from the City of Sacramento - arts in service of environment, health, social justice, and other aspects of civic life.

We believe there is room to grow in this area and we are excited to explore possibilities in advancing arts intersecting and advancing civic life.

As I continue to learn about the workflow rhythm of the operations of the Agency over the next few months our attention will shift to advancing the work of Council Committees, convening the Creative Economy Workgroup, advocating for the FY 2024–25 budget and preparing for the end of FY 2023–24.

None of this work is possible without the dedication, coordination, and collaboration of our extraordinary staff of the CAC. It's a pleasure to work with this esteemed group of professionals.

DRAFT MINUTES OF PUBLIC MEETING

November 17, 2023 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

1. Call to Order

Chair Montoya opened the meeting at 10:03 a.m.

2. Land and Peoples Acknowledgement

Council Member Messina Captor read the <u>CAC Land and Peoples Acknowledgement</u> into the record

3. Roll Call, Establishment of Quorum, and Community Agreements

Council Liaison Mason Diab conducted a roll call.

Present: Chair Consuelo Montoya, Vice Chair Vicki Estrada, Gerald Clarke, Caleb Duarte, Ellen Gavin, Leah Goodwin, Phil Mercado, Roxanne Messina Captor, Nicola Miner and Olivia Raynor.

With 10 of 11 present, a quorum was achieved.

Community Agreements were read into the record by Chair Montoya and Vice Chair Estrada.

4. Chair's Report

Chair Montoya reported that the CAC invests in California arts communities to build and sustain a healthy ecosystem. This helps the field extend outlets for creativity.

Discussions pertaining to the 2024 Grant Program recommendations provided by the Programs Policy Committee will take place at this meeting.

The Programs Policy Committee works with an iterative process and recent and longstanding programs will be discussed.

Public comments will be followed by Council discussion. The Programs Policy Committee will assess input and a vote will take place at our December meeting.

Chair Montoya welcomed Parliamentarian Lorenzo Cuesta, and had Cuesta introduce himself.

5. Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Moscone announced the outgoing status of his position. Moscone decided to step away from the next two Council meetings to allow for a free and unfettered discussion by Council and staff.

Moscone shared a brief, personal history with the CAC and a continued desire to support the Council and staff.

Travelling throughout the state conducting CAC business has been very rewarding.

Community meetings are vital and learning opportunities are enhanced using this venue.

The fragility, diversity, and interconnectedness of our ecosystems must be recognized. Diversity is our unique strength.

We must acknowledge that the intentions of everyone's actions and the CAC community are genuine and good.

Discussions to hone and refine Council policy and recommendations must continue with mutual respect. The best part of this position has been to be among people who care and are committed to our artists' ecosystem.

And to all of you, thank you for allowing me to serve as best I can.

Chair Montoya acknowledged and moved on to Approval of Minutes.

6. Voting Item: Council Minutes from Previous Council Meeting

There were no corrections to the minutes of the August 30, 2023 Council meeting and they were approved.

7. Public Comment

Chair Montoya explained the purpose and prohibitions for making Public Comment at CAC meetings. Public Affairs Specialist Kimberly Brown explained the process and provided specific instructions.

8. Discussion Item: Bylaws

On behalf of the Governance Committee, Council Member Miner gave a <u>brief overview</u> of some of the work done pertaining to bylaws and discussed with Chair Montoya specific areas changed and/or omitted or moved to another area.

Council Members read sections of the bylaws to Council Members for discussion.

Council Member Miner mentioned that the section on the duties and responsibilities of the Director is in the Council bylaws and the Council does not have jurisdiction over the Director. This gives the wrong impression that the Director is somehow hired by the Council, which they are not.

Parliamentarian Cuesta explained that Sections 8755 through 8756 is the ending part of the Dixon-Zenovich-Maddy-California Act, and that means that whatever was included must not contradict the conflict with that Act. If the contents of the Act are being repeated, they should be cited so as not to be confused with bylaws that can be amended.

Chair Montoya noted that the existing bylaws were not authored the current Council, and Chief Deputy Director Ungar clarified that the code sections are from the CAC enabling legislation that established the agency which is known as the Dixon-Zenovich-Maddy-California Arts Act of 1975.

The Council decided that these Sections, along with the full text of the CAC's enabling legislation, which is already included in our Handbook, be moved out of the bylaws and be referred to within the Handbook only, since it is not on the Council to vote on this language, but it is very important to have it as a reference point.

Discussion

Parliamentarian Cuesta suggested that the phrase, "Dixon-Zenovich-Maddy-California Arts Act of 1975" should be in the first paragraph of the bylaws. He also mentions that the end of all bylaws includes how to amend them, and that has not been listed in these bylaws.

Vice Chair Estrada, Chair Montoya, and Council Member Goodwin endorsed the suggestions from the parliamentarian.

Definition of Terms was brought to the floor for discussion.

Council Member Clarke addressed the stipulated bi-annual budget review and recommended establishing specific dates for this to happen.

The stipulated number of CAC meetings per year is in the enabling legislation and cannot be amended through the bylaws process.

Chief Deputy Director Ungar discussed the timeline and procedure for establishing the annual state budget and offered hypotheticals for determining specific dates for review.

The Council's purview is the Local Assistance Budget which is how the CAC votes regarding programs and allocations.

Deputy Director Kiburi chimed in to say that the actual, total budget for the Council is posted on the Department of Finance website. It is publicly accessible to look at the budget.

The authority over the Executive Director is the State Controller's Office and viewing of budget line items is accessible to the public.

Council Member Raynor suggested that on necessary state training, the wording should be changed to "upon appointment to the Council."

Vice Chair Estrada requested clarification around the length of terms of service for individual Council Members.

Chief Deputy Director Ungar stated that it is part of our enabling legislation and not something that is up for change or debate in the bylaws.

Director of Programs Margolis also noted that the rationale for these terms being staggered was to ensure that the Council does not lose all of its existing members simultaneously.

Director of Programs Margolis suggested that the Council set two dates where it can comprehensively go over the budget.

It was suggested that the Strategic Plan does not seem like a bylaws issue and should be in the Handbook

A discussion of the prohibition of sub-committees not meeting with other sub-committees unless in a publicly noticed venue was talked about and suggestions were made.

The CAC's role in advocacy was discussed and Chair Montoya noted that further information would be provided to the Council.

It was suggested that under the conflict-of-interest category, retired Council Members should not be allowed to lobby the Council for a period of one year from their leave of serve date.

The line of command and accountability of the Director's position was raised and the ramifications of this were discussed. These same issues were also mentioned pertaining to Council Members and staff.

Chief Deputy Director Ungar clarified that the Director serves at the pleasure of and is appointed by the governor and reports directly to the Governor's Office.

It was clarified that the CAC is a formal state agency and reports to the Department of Finance for anything related to its budget, and to the Governor's Office for policy and procedures.

Chair Montoya deferred further investigation to the Governance Committee.

Council Member Raynor made suggestions under the section pertaining to Responsibilities of the Chair, and advocated for a statement assuring that planning for access is incorporated into the daily operations of the agency and Council Meetings.

Wording stating that meetings are accessible and meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act should be included.

Chair Montoya stated that the utilization of ad hock committees has become a fruitful tool and language enhancing their use should be explored.

It would be ideal to see a redline version of the bylaws at the next meeting to make sure Council members are aware of what moved off and what stayed on and what was added.

The Committee List and Descriptions has been removed. Chair Montoya requested input from the Committee or deferring to Parliamentarian Cuesta if that does not really belong in the bylaws and if it should live somewhere else.

Parliamentarian Cuesta stated that Committee Lists and Descriptions are found in bylaws because the ones listed are standing committees. The ones not listed are the disbanded ones and ad hoc committees.

He also clarified referring to changes as "amendments" and suggested instead referring to them as "revisions" to the bylaws.

Council Member Messina Captor clarified that a decision was made to include Committees and their responsibilities in the Handbook. If this needs to be in the bylaws, it can be put back but it was not just deleted.

Parliamentarian Cuesta stated that the custom is to leave them in the by-laws because they become "standing committees" and are very different from ad hoc.

9. Presentation and Q-and-A on Grant Programs

Council Members read published descriptions of CAC programs under considering for the 2024 grant cycle, including Title, Purpose, History, Grant Amount Maximum, and End of Funding Period.

Council Member Raynor noted that the Arts and Accessibility program is missing, which was acknowledged by Chair Montoya.

Vice Chair Estrada wanted to know if maximum amounts of grants were ever revised based on any kind of feedback from the field and how the amounts were determined.

Director of Programs Margolis stated that the Allocations Committee established a range.

Council Member Clarke pondered what the impacts of Prop. 28 might be and that data showing high-demand programs would be useful.

Council Member Messina Captor pointed out that a lot of the educational programs are very similar and asked about grantee parameters with an eye to potential redundancy.

Director of Programs Margolis informed the Council that applicants can apply for more than one grant and across programs.

The impact of Prop. 28 is unknown at this time with over \$1 billion to be infused into our school systems.

It was mentioned that the Council developed the Impacts Projects program to use as an umbrella grant program to absorb previous individualized/specific project-based grant programs such as Reentry for the Arts, Veterans for the Arts, etc.

Attention was drawn to the fact that the Individual Artist Fellowship Program was not on the list or in the recommendations.

Council Member Raynor observed that the Individual Fellowship Program description in the packet did not include how funds were allocated to conduct specific outreach to be inclusive of disabled artists therefore making it an incomplete description.

Director of Programs Margolis talked about the Arts and Accessibility Program mentioning its purpose and targeted populations.

Vice Chair Estrada noted the poor response to the Folk and Traditional Arts Program and wondered if increased outreach might be in order. Chair Montoya responded by saying that the opportunity for Folk and Traditional Arts is an administering organization and had been opened to new applicants. Council Member Raynor cautioned against blaming the applicant pool when evaluating the value of any CAC program. There may be factors beyond the applicant's control that will determine the final numbers.

Deputy Director Kiburi emphasized that a change to language to be less direct with regard to racial equity was implemented to avoid any potential perception of a violation of Proposition 209 and the equal protections clause of the 14th Amendment.

10. Break

Chair Montoya called for a 30-min lunch break from 12:45 p.m. to 1:15 p.m.

11. 2024 Grant Programs Discussion

Council Members Ellen Gavin and Leah Goodwin <u>provided the overview of considerations</u> to lead the 2024 Grant Programs discussion on behalf of the Programs Policy Committee.

Council Member Gavin informed the Council of the efforts and process they used in gathering feedback from the field. Hearing from the SLPs and SRNs was very helpful.

Guidelines, principles, and suggestions regarding the CAC process and outcomes were shared with the Council.

Vice Chair Estrada inquired as to the basis for determining the suggested \$3 million budget limitation. Council Members Goodwin and Gavin explained that in order to save money, it made sense to cut funds based on budget size. Exceptions should be based on current conditions and more research is needed.

Council Member Raynor noted that State and Local Partners are a county-level network essentially, and State and Regional Networks are based under some other affinity. Redundancies are possible and refining is needed. SRNs were established as an emerging idea and often were very grassroots in the early days; technology has changed the dynamics on the concept of networks.

Council Member Messina Captor suggested that panels need to increase their conversations with their peer reviewers regarding potential grantees before making decisions. The current process often has decisions being made by individuals in silos without any discussion or input from other panelists or guidance from staff.

Council Member Clarke mentioned Prop. 28 and potential funding streams for a variety of programs under Item 4: Arts Education Programs. It was suggested that Council do a deeper dive pertaining to actual grants and timelines, and especially regarding the \$2 million figure. Chief Deputy Director Ungar explained that funding for Prop. 28 is dedicated only within the Department of Education to fund credentialed teacher positions as art teachers in classrooms only.

Staff reminds Council members that the budget is never final until around September of 2024.

Council discussed the possibility of different tiers of funding between statewide networks and regional networks. Networks are not always geographically based, and Council's preference should be established. Categories should be delineated and recognized with some type of order established contingent upon CAC priorities, especially funding going directly to artists.

The goal with SRNs is to focus on grantees involved with services for artists, creators, and tradition bearers. A description of what constitutes a network was read into the record from the Guidelines.

Staff can provide Council members with a clear analysis of the best way to utilize CAC funds to complement Prop 28 at a future meeting.

A continuation of funding for SLPs was proposed, and it was noted that some of the larger SLPs don't mind the reduction of their funds.

Chair Montoya recalled questioning the SLP model – the per capita versus the equity model. Removing SLPs entirely breaks the idea of covering California. Engaging the SLP Coalition will help the Council understand the variations and different needs of the field.

Council Member Messina Captor asked for the rationale behind the request limitation for organizations with budgets in excess \$3.5 million per year.

There is ongoing debate on this. Destabilization is not wanted. Perhaps an across-the-board reduction is warranted.

Vice Chair Estrada questioned committing to the specific number of adding 10 new Cultural Districts to creating an artificial situation considering new or emerging cultural districts. Stipulating "up to" and not necessarily declaring a definite number might be useful.

Leftover money for Cultural Districts could be used for planning grants or developing cultural districts nearing a level of development to qualify them for funding was suggested by staff.

The idea of the Cultural Anchors Institutions Project was discussed; this is based on the old Multicultural Advancement program, and these would be organizations within the CAC's equity priorities.

Council Member Gavin stated that the intention of this proposed program is to provide support for institutions who are survivors and represent underserved communities who have evolved to be hubs of the community. They have decades of experience and potentially been cut out from support through the GenOps program due to budget limitations within the guidelines. They are unrelated to State and Regional Networks.

Guidelines should be very clear as to what the CAC is looking for from the field, and staff should screen that. If they do not meet the criteria, then they should not be considered.

Council discussed the GenOps program ensuring that organizations are not double or triple "dipping" funding and to see guidelines are clear on granting parameters. Staff recommended that Guidelines restrictions should be discussed in finalizing this document. GenOps funding should be reviewed for possible redundancies.

An earlier discussion by staff on Item 10 concluded that the Native American Initiative needed more vetting and input before bringing it up for a vote by Council.

It was noted that Items 10, 11, and 12 are all connected because they are all related to being able to fund work necessary for a variety of programs.

Council Member Clarke strongly encourage and advocated for consideration of the Cultural Pathways program to return in the 2024 cycle.

The Governance Committee's decision to omit Cultural Pathways was based on 80 percent of the GenOps funds going to smaller organizations in this last grant cycle.

Staff stressed that funding restrictions within guidelines have made it clear that at no time can an organization get two operational support grants at the same time.

Council needs to make sure that redundancies are not being created and that gaps are covered – the Committee should discuss this with staff and analyze any additional data.

Chair Montoya asked Council Members to mention any other programs that were not discussed or that needed to be discussed further.

Council Member Gavin wondered if it was possible to go back and fund midsized groups that ranked high but did not get funded during the GenOps vote in August. Committee members Gavin and Goodwin discussed potential hypotheticals pertaining to funding in these categories.

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The Individual Artists Fellowship Program was mentioned by Chair Montoya as not appearing on the list and asked what thoughts Council might have on this.

Council Member Goodwin thought highly of this program but was uncertain how it could be funded with the dearth of funds available – Council input was sought.

The Council's discussion included various potential strategies for extending monies to benefit the largest possible number of organizations. Consistent feedback from the field is the need to get money directly to artists. Data allows the Council to target organizations for funding with the most effective programs.

Support for particular programs was voiced, especially funding individual artists.

Staff is happy to provide data relating to funding based on budget size and total revenue.

Timeliness of deliberations affecting programs is essential and choices must be made. Decisions are cycle specific but have multi-year ramifications.

The Committee studied all the potentialities contingent upon available funding. The retention of programs funneling money directly to artists was prioritized.

The Council acknowledged the tremendous work done by the Committee and discussion was conducive to voicing diverse perspectives as opposed to diminishing the latitude, depth and value of work wrought by the Committee.

The issue of having to vote in December on these items was raised because budgetary timelines seem to be moving targets. An open meeting of the Committee might be appropriate in contributing to enhanced feedback.

If Impact Projects and GenOps grants are indeed agreed upon as priorities as Council Member Gavin suggested, the question was asked as to how Council expresses that priority in intended funding for specific programs without creating additional procedural requirements.

Parliamentarian Cuesta pointed out that the bylaws stipulate that it is the Council that has complete accountability. Priority setting has been left up to a Committee without Council voting on anything, and establishment of priorities as a body is critical to enable Council to vote on program funding in alignment with these priorities. He suggests a vote on instructions to the committee so that priorities are made clear.

Staff informed Council that December is when voting on the slate of programs for 2024 is scheduled followed by voting on the guidelines in January. Committee recommendations are still to be voted on by the Council, and the first iteration of the governor's budget in January will better inform Council as to where they are in terms of local assistance funds available.

Staff also reminded Council that money from 2024 has already been reserved to fund the second year of the two-year Folk and Traditional Arts and GenOps programs.

Council Member Goodwin asked the Council to clarify a strategy for 2024.

Sentiments on this were as follows:

- Council is asking grantee institutions to tighten their belts.
- Overlapping grant programs have the potential to be consolidated.
- Cuts must be across the board.
- Additional cuts may still exist and should be explored.
- New programs are probably not fundable at the present time.
- Committee clearly carried out their mission.
- Creating pathways that are not redundant is necessary.

A concern about the tone, vote, and decision regarding GenOps was raised by Council Member Raynor. She opined that a suggestion that Council's decision was a mistake is unfounded, and to frame a previous decision as a mistake and Council proposing something to compensate for that mistake is dislikeable. If priorities are clear, then programs can be anchored to them. Decisions should be made based on clearly established priorities.

Council Member Gavin feels that a mistake was made in that 80 percent of GenOps money is going to organizations with budgets under \$250,000, and that Tiers 2 and 3 with higher budgets did not get the percentage of allocations that were estimated within the program guidelines.

Staff informed the Committee that packages have been prepared that will allow them to chat with the Legislature about how additional funds could be used.

Chair Montoya referenced the GenOps vote and the previous request the Chair received to review that vote. An extensive amount of time was taken, exhausting all directions with great integrity and great respect for each participant on the Council. The Chair made a decision informed by consultation with many different perspectives. It was a legal vote, and Council needs abide by their procedures and move forward.

12. Committee Reports.

Chair Montoya reminded the Council Members of the Strategic Framework Committee's request to submit their priorities to be incorporated in the aspirations of the Strategic Framework

This will then be brought to Council for discussion for integration of priorities into the Strategic Framework.

Committee Reports consisted of the Ad Hoc Partnerships Committee and the Ad Hoc Disabilities, Access and Inclusion Committee.

Council Member Mercado introduced the Ad Hoc Partnerships Committee, noting that an extension of their deadline would be needed to establish a baseline of partnership development, which will focus on partnership development within state government. This is being done with the intent of enhancing, strengthening, and informing state government of the CAC's work and activities to foster increased support.

Council Member Raynor introduced the Disability, Access and Inclusion Committee. Historical Council developments were mentioned as well as emphasizing the long history of the CAC working with the disability community. Information needs to be gathered to update the Council on existing field conditions to better serve the disability community.

13. In Memoriam

Vice Chair Estrada read into the record the poem "When I Think of Death" by Maya Angelou, and acknowledged the recent passing and celebrated the legacies of the following creatives:

Council Member Goodwin mentioned a young woman who sent in the name of her friend Migwa Nthiga, a commercial and documentary photographer based in Kenya with work focusing on indigenous communities.

Director of Programs Margolis added Robert Laos, who was a former staff member at the CAC for many years and a musician.

14. Adjournment

In closing thoughts, Parliamentarian Cuesta mentioned committees may have meetings and consist of more than two Council members provided that the meetings are open with public notice.

It was noted that individuals who are running for Chair and Vice Chair for 2024 will need to put themselves forward at the December meeting via a self-nomination process. Director of Programs Margolis added that this methodology is to ensure that there is no outside-of-public-meeting coordination or communication among Council Members. Any discussions around candidacy and nominations should take place in the open as is required.

Chair Montoya adjourned the meeting at 3:59 p.m.

8. Voting Item: Council Minutes from Previous Council Meeting

The October 25, 2023, December 12, 2023, and February 1, 2024 Meeting Minutes were approved.

Council Member Clarke noted that the November 17, 2023 Minutes are in the printed but were not provided electronically.

MOTION: Council Member Clarke moved to table the November 17, 2023 Minutes, seconded by Council Member Estrada.

11. General Public Comment

Acting Chair Goodwin explained the purpose and prohibitions for making Public Comment at CAC meetings. Public Affairs Director Gutierrez explained the process and provided specific instructions.

In-person Public Comment.

Hugo Morales:

- The Land Acknowledgement is important to Native People.
- Folk arts enable Native People to perpetuate their cultures.
- Christopher Columbus introduced slavery into the Americas.

Shirley Kazio Miramoto:

- My mother gifted me her music and it became an important part of my life.
- Because of the WWII internments, many Japanese Americans felt a shame toward their culture and arts.

- Traditional arts in the Japanese American community are dying.
- By teaching and performing I am striving to keep them alive.

Megan Kraus Fijoles, Theater Bay Area:

- Service organizations are the corral reefs of the arts ecosystem.
- We are the Bay Area's only theater service organization.
- We are a network of over 2500 individual artists and nearly 200 theaterproducing companies.
- We have received regular SRN funding from the CAC for many years and perplexingly we were denied this past year resulting in destabilizing our theater work in the Bay Area.
- We urge careful consideration of your review process insofar as changes are concerned.
- Applicant organizations need further clarification on CAC expectations.

Alexandra Urbanowski, Silicon Valley Creates:

- We are an SLP for Santa Clara County of nearly two million people.
- We thank CAC's commitment to the field and its work on SLPs.
- We collaborate with other SLPs to expand the impacts in our region.
- We would ask that CAC agendize a future presentation on the regional impact of the IAF and the Creative Core administrative models.

Nancy Uhm, a teaching artist:

- We support artists in schools, family dance and public parks and libraries.
- We have been a recipient of an SRN grant for the past three years.
- We ask that you consider an SRN's potential impact when awarding funds.

Lacey Williams a San Diego Resident with Serene:

- I have worked with prison populations for over 16 years.
- I have greatly benefitted from West African drumming in my community.
- We are frequently asked to drum for cultural events.
- Our CAC grants help us continue our work in the communities we serve.

Francis Coffey, a dance teacher with Access:

- I teach Ghanian traditional music, dancing and singing.
- Classes are conducted at Richmond Elementary School.
- I received a grant last year and purchased instruments from Ghana.

Acacia Chan with Ethnic Ties:

- We run local culture-based organizations in Oakland.
- CAC grants help us continue traditional artist storytelling via regenerative tourism in Oakland.
- We do this through our China Town, Black Oakland, and Taco Tour.
- The pandemic caused the loss of many of our elders and our CAC grant helps us mitigate some of these losses.

Virtual Public Comment

Shira Lane, Atrium 916:

- We are a creative innovation center for sustainability.
- We appreciate our CAC grant.

Jennifer Caballero, California Association of Museums:

- We are a grateful SRN recipient.
- Now is the time for the CAC to define terms of the data collection expectation.
- Some SRNs may have the capacity to do this, but many do not.
- I recommend forming a task-specific advisory group composed of SRN recipients.
- The California Networks Council is a possible model for this.
- Careful planning is necessary to enable the collection of information relevant to the evaluation and development of prioritized grant initiatives.
- I would urge this action prior to finalizing guidelines.

Cecilia Yen, Film Independent, a champion of creative independence and visual storytelling:

- We support artists and audiences who embody diversity and curiosity.
- We do not support the \$5 million cap on potential applicants.
- This will harm our ability to provide critical fundraising support to small organizations and individual artists.
- We do recognize the importance of funding smaller organizations but we urge you to reconsider taking funding away from this group of organizations.

Nancy Olivares, California Humanities:

- We are the only non-profit devoted to promoting the humanities throughout California. CAC funding is significantly impactful for us.
- We help to shape the future through the intersection of the arts and humanities.
- SRN funding helps amplify visual and performing arts, and public programming through an equitable humanities lens.

Leslie Castellano, Ink People Center for the Arts and Culture:

- We are recipient of SRN funding and are excited about the data collection requirements. We need more data to support advocacy efforts.
- Implementation is a cause for concern and CAC should create a tool kit for this endeavor.
- The three-county requirement for regional networks creates challenges for those of us in places affected by winter storms, fires, and geographic barriers.
- We are concerned that you will begin to see an absence of network members located in rural areas.
- It is beneficial for organizations with small and large budgets to share a robust network of SRNs.

Ricky Abilez, Arts for LA:

- We have concerns about the proposed SRN guidelines.
- Arts advocates generally agree that budget caps are not an effective way to narrow eligibility because pass-through funds and/or regranting are not accounted for.
- We generally agree with CAC's commitment to equity and expanding funding to smaller arts organizations.
- We also know that SRNs tend to serve as intermediaries for small arts organizations and non-profits which is not reflected in total operating budgets.
- We recommend that the \$5 million cap exclude pass-through funds and regranting from budget totals.
- Data collection should be further clarified and delineated.

Natalia Neira, La Peña Cultural Center:

- We applaud your efforts to diversify funding.
- La Peña serves as the home to 15 roots arts classes with culture bearers from different Latin American and Caribbean diasporas and hip-hop.
- We are an incubator for disenfranchised artists and cultural leaders.
- Our biggest need is infrastructural support enabling us to successfully apply and navigate the grant process.

Jenny Balisle, Arts Contra Costa County, Arts CCC:

- I have been an artist, educator, curator, and administrator for over 15 years.
- The Board of Supervisors designated us and our fiscal sponsor to serve as the County's official local arts agency.
- Our top priority is to be an equitable and sustainable arts organization for our county.
- We currently have an inspiring poetry program at juvenile hall.
- We are currently expanding to provide additional services.

Tracy Hudak, Californians for the Arts:

- We are an SRN grantee, and we appreciate your engagement with the field.
- We would like to see the guidelines clarified to make sure they align better with SRN functions and serve the state more effectively.
- We strongly advise against using budget caps to determine eligibility.
- We propose that you consider a three-year average of budgets.
- You should adjust the definition of "regional" to be more self-determined by SRNs. This is a big concern with our rural areas.

Written public comment:

 Julia Murphy, Pedal Press, Butte County Previous or Current Grantee: JUMP StArts, Impact Projects

To the California Arts Council:

We received a Jump StArts planning grant in 2022-23. We planned our project believing that there was also a project grant that would be available to fund the actual project. Recent communication with CAC staff revealed that "The JMP StArts grant (including project & planning) will not be opening or continuing for 2024 and there is no projected date for them to reopen."

CAC funds paid young people to participate in planning this project; and this is a setback to their work and the subsequent project (of providing Art and screenprinting internships to youth on probation)—as well as making us look unreliable to our partners in the project.

From the Field Scan Report (p 30):

"To build trusting relationships, it's important to approach communities on their own terms (and on their own timeline), with a tangible commitment to better supporting their needs, and then follow through on that commitment."

The lack of follow-through and transparency in re: the project grant was...unexpected. What is puzzling on a larger level is that CAC went to the trouble of compiling the Field Scan Report that indicated the organization's renewed commitment to equitable funding.

If that is the case: why on earth would CAC discontinue a grant that specifically benefitted the category of people who are historically excluded from artmaking opportunities, as the data from the Field Scan Report shows?

Warm greetings, Chair, Council Members, Executive Director and Staff, from the ancestral home of the Acjachemen Nation-Juaneno Band of Mission Indians. Arts Orange County is your State-Local Partner serving this 3.2 million population county comprised of 34 cities and a highly-diverse population, which our Board mirrors in its composition. We also serve CAC as the Administering Organization for its Individual Artist Fellowship Program for the 5-county Region I (Imperial, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego), where we have exponentially increased the number of applicants and recipients. Understanding that the current year budget constraints have made it necessary to defer CAC offering this program in 2024, we look forward to sharing with you in depth data about its impacts in our region when you make plans for 2025. We are an independent nonprofit organization with a budget of only \$800,000, and we serve more than 600 arts & cultural organizations through a robust menu of programs. Like many SLPs, it is difficult to secure contributed income since we are primarily a service organization and not an arts producer. Therefore, we supplement our grants through contract services in cultural planning and public art management for local cities. In addition to generating earned revenue, this strengthens our advocacy

networks which we employ regularly to connect with our State Legislators and to promote increased funding for the CAC. Learn more about us at ArtsOC.org.

 Elida Ledesma (She/Her/Hers), Arts for Healing and Justice Network, Los Angeles County

Previous or Current Grantee: Creative Youth Development (formerly Youth Arts Action), Statewide and Regional Networks

RE: Agenda Item 11. VOTING ITEM: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

As a current recipient of the State and Regional Networks, our organization is able to sustain the various pieces of work necessary for successful partnerships. This funding is enabling us to support smaller organizations while they build out their capacity but it also helps us leverage our collective impact. While I understand the intention behind setting a budget cap, I strongly urge the CAC to reconsider as that would have an impact on larger organizations that are still crucial to the arts ecosystem. I believe the CAC should factor in whether funds are being regranted and what populations are being served. The SRN's serve a vital role in our sector and the impact of our work is more nuanced than that of direct service organizations. We invite the council to engage in thoughtful conversations with existing SRN's to better understand our impact and challenges before implementing reforms that could negatively impact many organizations receiving this source of funding.

 Sarah Weber (She/Her/Hers), Association of California Symphony Orchestras, Los Angeles County
 Previous or Current Grantee: Statewide and Regional Networks
 RE: Agenda Item 11. VOTING ITEM: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

Thanks to the Council for maintaining the SRN program. I would like to share 3 recommendations to the SRN program revisions.

- 1 REVISE THE \$5M BUDGET CAP REQUIREMENT: Do not place a budget cap on eligibility, as budget level alone does not accurately reflect capacity or impact. If there must be a cap, adjust the \$5M budget threshold requirement by excluding from budget totals any pass-thru funds or fiscal sponsorship revenues. Also, consider a 3-year average for budgets.
- 2 REFINE DATA COLLECTION REQUIREMENT: While supportive of the potential of this recommendation, concerns exist about the nature, composition, and expectations of the data collection, as well as SRNs capacity to undertake research. CAC should develop the survey instruments and fund SRNs to disseminate. Or form a Data Collection Advisory Group comprised of SRNs and SLPs to help define research scope and methods, clarify what needs to be measured, and ensure against harmful data extraction.
- 3 REVISE DEFINITION of "REGIONS": A more nuanced and self-determined definition of "region" is needed that better fits arts service orgs' work, which often does

not neatly align with county boundaries or population numbers. SRNs should be able to clearly describe and define our own cultural network or service areas, and then evaluated on our impact. And capacity is an important factor, especially in rural areas that face barriers like terrain, distance, weather, and lack of access to other funding.

 Jessica Mele (She/Her/Hers), Create CA, Los Angeles County Previous or Current Grantee: Creative Youth Development (formerly Youth Arts Action), Statewide and Regional Networks RE: Agenda Item 11. VOTING ITEM: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

Thank you for recognizing the value of state and regional networks to a healthy arts ecosystem. Our work at Create CA in arts education policy and advocacy could not be done without a statewide network of advocates (artists, teachers, teaching artists, parents, students and school administrators). This network has become essential since the passage of Prop 28, and the need to ensure that training, materials, information and support reaches school communities in all 58 counties of California.

We appreciate the value of the \$5m budget cap. To account for one-time increases in revenue that could be the result of a multi-year grant whose funds are all received in one fiscal year, we recommend a three year average be used to assess organizational size. In addition, we recommend that re-granting dollars and fiscally-sponsored projects (efforts that are a net neutral to an organization's bottom line) be excluded from the \$5m budget cap calculation.

We appreciate the data component of the new guidelines. And at the same time, as an arts education advocacy organization, our data collection includes information on students, schools, and advocates in our networks. These data may not be compatible with the CAC's expected data points pertaining to communities of (non-student, practicing) artists and culture bearers. We suggest that the CAC clarify its goals around data collection so that we can best assess how to meet them, given our organizational structure and resources.

• Cynthia PEPPER (She/Her/Hers), CPDANCEworks, Marin County Previous or Current Grantee: Artists in Schools, Arts and Accessibility

I feel and have direct evidence to support my stance that the CAC prefers and favors diversity choices over artistic choices for all your grants, programming and projects. Marin County and Caucasian people are completely left out and the reverse prejudice is blatant. Very unfair and quite shameful. Diversity over Artistry. Look at the individual grants! I stand corrected.

 Shayla James (She/Her/Hers), San Diego Creative Youth Development Network, San Diego County

Previous or Current Grantee: Statewide and Regional Networks RE: Agenda Item 11. VOTING ITEM: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

I am the Director of the San Diego Creative Youth Development Network (SDCYDN). I was looking forward to seeing the proposed Statewide and Regional Network (SRN) grant guidelines and was interested in reading the reconfigured guidelines. I have two main recommendations for the Council to consider. Data Collection is informative, necessary, and can be exciting for those collecting information and those sharing their information. However, I have concerns about what data will be collected, how, and why. I would like more clarity about what data collection entails. Also, gathering data takes additional administrative labor, so how can the Council create supports, especially for smaller organization capacity? Can the CAC create a survey and data collection tool to distribute to SRNs, with our input about what data will be collected? Also, how the data is collected is important to ensure data extraction methods that cause harm do not occur.

My second recommendation for the Council is to more clearly define a regional network. The SDCYDN works across communities and geography, however we practice depth instead breadth of our work. While some members in other Counties attend our virtual meetings, we primarily serve communities in SD County. The SDCYDN is a supporter of the SRN grant and I ask for clarity in the proposed guidelines, so that I can better understand what SRNs the CAC is seeking to invest in through the revised SRN guidelines.

 Meg Hamill (She/Her/Hers), California Poets in the Schools, Sonoma County Previous or Current Grantee: Artists in Schools, Impact Projects RE: Agenda Item 11. VOTING ITEM: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

As the ED of California Poets in the Schools, I am grateful to the CAC for a decadeslong funding relationship supporting both our work in schools, as well as our network of professional poets throughout the state. We offer a professional, network experience for California poets that includes over 60 annual training and networking events, a 3-day poetry conference, fundraising assistance, affiliation with a nationally-recognized nonprofit, as well as a clear pathway to earn income and give back to their local communities as Poet-Teachers. Our grassroots model allows us a unique ability to engage communities of poets in any town in CA, and indeed our programs are flourishing in some of the most remote regions. We have received the SRN grant for many years, however we did not receive the grant this past year. To my knowledge, there were no organizations specifically serving networks of poets who received SRN funding in 2023. After this council considered shutting down the SRN program altogether, and after carefully reading through the guidelines this year, I find myself confused about the overarching vision that the current council holds for this grant program. It seems much narrower than the past. This grant is vital to our ability to serve our network and I sincerely hope that the vision for this program remains broad and supple enough to continue engaging specific arts networks such as ours so that we can continue to provide critical arts services throughout the state.

Michael Tamony (He/Him/His), The Center for the Arts, Nevada County

Previous or Current Grantee: Artists in Schools, Arts Education Exposure, Creative Youth Development (formerly Youth Arts Action)

The Center for the Arts in Grass Valley is the most established arts 501c3 in the rural Foothills above Sacramento. We serve a rural population that is in desperate need for arts and arts education. We are grateful for the support we have received from the California Arts Council. While me may be known for sold out concerts like Lyle Lovett, Keb' Mo', Blind Boys of Alabama, and others, we are also presenting enriching content like WorldFest, children's theater productions, and a host of arts-related programs.

Our recent grant from CAC, helped deliver a children's theater production of Mozart that was seen by a packed house, primarily children who had never even seen live theater.

We are writing to the CAC Board to emphasize the need to support rural community art. Nevada County, including Grass Valley and Nevada City have a vibrant arts community that is in serious need of support from agencies like CAC, especially through an established entity like The Center for the Arts.

We have a history of success, but we can not succeed alone. We need you.

12. Voting Item: 2024 Grant Programs Guidelines

Acting Chair Goodwin called the afternoon session to order and called for Item 12 to be presented.

Program managers Elisa Gollub and Carlos Casillas briefly introduced this item. Program Manger Casillas presented a detailed history and development summary of the program.

Council Member Gavin of the Programs Policy Committee covered the history and development of the Programs Policy Committee.

Acting Chair Goodwin noted that the Programs Policy Committee did look at the Decision Support Tool to inform their decisions.

A list of decisions to be made by the Council was read into the record by Acting Chair Goodwin.

Executive Director Brazell noted that this is part of the CAC's commitment to transparent and informed decision-making. As part of the Strategic Framework this Decision Support Tool is also a bedrock.

Public Comment

Acting Chair Goodwin explained the purpose and prohibitions for making Public Comment at CAC meetings. Public Affairs Director Gutierrez explained the process and provided specific instructions.

- We explore ways for artists to have a sustainable career path in the arts.

- We were established in April 2023, and this is new to me.
- Our mission is to provide jobs for young artists and art teachers.
- We are a cultural dance studio focusing on Mexican, Peruvian, Colombian and South American folk dance while also incorporating Hip-Hop.

Liz Baselia, LA Swing Dance Posse:

- We are a small 501(C)(3) that is a dance team endeavoring to preserve, protect, and teach vernacular jazz and swing dancing.
- We are excited to see the continuation of funding for small organizations.

Felicia Shaw, Executive Director, San Diego Regional Arts & Culture Coalition:

- We are an arts advocacy and arts services organization serving San Diego County.
- We thank you for listening to the field and making appropriate decisions to the SRN Guidelines.

I would encourage you to ensure that the review panels are adequately trained.

The motion as moved by Council Member Clarke is to accept the recommendation of the Programs Policy Committee as amended by Council Member Raynor to approve the Statewide and Regional Networks Program Guidelines including the policy change to restrict applicants from applying for the SRN grants that have total revenues equal to or greater than \$5 million in the most recently completed fiscal year, seconded by Council Member Estrada.

There were 7 yes Votes and 0 No Votes.

Member Raynor advocated for revising Council verbiage to make access to the CAC more positive and inviting and that applicant accessibility managers be identified.

Vice Chair Goodwin noted that a two-year average pertaining to applicant budgets has been used in the past and that a three-year average was not considered by the Programs Policy Committee.

The \$5 million dollar cap was informed by the field and perhaps the new Programs Policy Committee can revisit this stipulation.

Council Member Gavin was open to considering a three-year average and Director of Programs Margolis stated that pass-through funds are considered when looking at the total for applicant budgets.

Council Member Estrada recommended that a more welcoming verbiage should be applied to all CAC programs.

Director of Programs Margolis noted that there had been a reconvening of SRNs in 2018 and additional ones before that. Quantifying the amount of pass-through funds per applicant has not been done and the process and procedures for such have not been established.

Executive Director Brazell emphasized the incredible importance of the Decision Support Tool informing decision-making by the CAC.

Council Member Clarke had concerns about the staff's ability to determine total revenues including pass-through funds and other factors not currently delineated.

Julie Baker made a presentation via <u>Powerpoint presentation</u>. Historical data and ongoing developments specific to Californians for the Arts were discussed.

Council Members thanked Julie and briefly touched on various aspects of the details given during the presentation.

14. Committee Reports

Council Member Clarke of the Equity Committee shared his and Council Member Duarte's report with the Council. An update was given and potentially useful information for future Equity Committee endeavors was provided.

The CAC Programs Staff is presenting the list of applicants for the 2024 grant review panelist pool for Council review and approval.

Purpose

The purpose of this memo is to provide a list of applicants who wish to serve as panelists for the 2024 grantmaking cycle for Council to review and approve.

Background

The California Arts Council (CAC) panelists play a critical role in the grant application process as representatives of their arts and cultural disciplines as well as of their respective communities. They work independently to evaluate grant applications based on review criteria approved by the Council. The CAC has developed this process to ensure an equitable ranking of applications by peers and transparent allocation of program funds.

The CAC invited members of our various networks, including former panelists, grant applicants, and organizational partners (Statewide-Regional Networks, State- Local Partners, CA Creative Corps, and Cultural Districts) to apply and to help publicize this opportunity. The CAC shared the opportunity widely through social media and communication channels and extended the application period from 4 weeks to 8 weeks. The CAC is grateful for the exceptional number of applications received.

The following pages present demographics and biographies of 916 applications submitted between January 12, 2024 and March 8, 2024. The CAC received 115 more panel applications than in 2023, with 20% of those applicants having prior CAC panel service. The CAC selects reviewers from this pool when curating diverse peer review panels, unique to each grant program. Although there are a number of distinguished panel applicants, based on the number of grant applications received and the necessary number of panels needed, not all panel applicants will have the opportunity to serve.

Note: Data entries were submitted directly by panel applicants; language, spelling, grammar, and capitalization remain as originally recorded. Views and opinions expressed by panel applicants in their submissions do not represent those of the California Arts Council.

Demographics Summary

Race and Ethnicity

Panelists were asked to select how they identify themselves and were given the ability to select more than one response, which many panelists did. The most frequently selected responses were White/Caucasian (39.4%), Black / African American (15.2%), Latinx / Chicanx (12.7%). The broad range of responses are available in detail in the enclosed table.

Gender Identity

The most frequently selected responses were Female (69.7%) and Male (22.7%). A number of panel applicants selected multiple gender identities; the broad range of responses are available in detail in the enclosed graph.

Primary Artistic Area of Experience

The most frequently selected responses were Visual Arts (33%), followed by Multidisciplinary (20%) and Music (12%). Multidisciplinary can include all categories, such as Visual, Music, Theater, Literary, Dance, Media, and Folk/Traditional Art. The broad range of responses are available in detail in the enclosed graph.

County

The largest number of applicants are from Los Angeles (31.7%), Alameda (10.4%), San Diego (8.0%) and San Francisco (4.8%). The remaining percentages are distributed statewide, covering 47 out of the 58 counties in the state.

Age

The most frequently selected responses were the 35-54 range (42%), 55-70 range (26%), and 25-34 (18%).







They are working towards their long-term goal of establishing a permanent home base for their 500+ artifacts that will also serve as a cultural community center for both the Syrian community and the Southern California public.

Beyond music, she founded Mercury Orbit Music, a tech-driven startup, which gained prominence through initiatives like XPRIZE and partnerships with organizations like the United Nations, Ted X Talk San Marino. Zhang's entrepreneurial journey includes recognition from various accelerators and grants, highlighting her commitment to innovation in both music and technology sectors. In 2022, her project titled "A.I.-enabled Music Program" was rewarded by the California Arts Council with two grants.

Tom Zimberoff; San Francisco

Artistic Area of Experience: Visual Arts

Tom studied music at USC before pivoting to photojournalism. With the legendary Sygma Photo Agency, he covered hundreds of historical and breaking news stories worldwide.

His career took off — literally — with a helicopter carrying the military dictator of Panama. Tom was a stowaway. As a young freelancer trying to make his bones, hoping to grab exclusive photos of the inscrutably camera-shy ruler, Gen.Omar Torrijos, it turned out to be an entrée to more than twenty years of shooting for Time magazine.

His first 2 portraits were Marx and Lennon: Groucho & John. He's shot hundreds more, including magazine covers from Ava Gardner to Steve Jobs, plus two sitting American presidents for the covers of Time and Fortune. His work is found in the National Portrait Gallery in London, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and the San Francisco Museum of Performance + Design. It is archived at the Briscoe Center for American History at the University of Texas at Austin.

Zimberoff wrote Focus on Profit, a textbook about the business of photography. He also wrote and illustrated 2 volumes about motorcycle culture, exhibited at the Clinton Presidential Library & Museum.

ai Hanes has been thinking about an anti-racism youth program for young people since the spring of 2018. That's when someone "threw racial slurs" at a pair of young mixed-race kids riding their bicycles down Broad

"I couldn't believe this happened to these kids in this day and age," said Hanes. "And I couldn't believe how much the kids themselves were interested in addressing the situation."

With guidance from Hanes and others, the two boys organized The Youth Ride Against Racism, in which dozens of young people and adults rode bikes down Nevada City's main drag, cheered by spectators. "The entire freakin' Broad St was filled with people bike riding," recalls Hanes. A video about the ride scored thousands of views.



"I left the city because of the violence." Hanes said in an interview in a KVMR-FM studio, his makeshift office. "Iam with all this knowledge, so let me show you how it's to be different to be confused.

Committee members are appointed by the Council Chair, in consultation with the Executive Director. 

Christopher Durang









Roberto Cavalli, 83




