The Arts in Corrections (AIC) program is made possible through a partnership between the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) and the California Arts Council (CAC). The program is designed to have a positive impact on the social and emotional well-being of people experiencing incarceration, to promote healing both inside and outside the boundaries of the institutions.

Administered by the CAC, AIC arts programming is provided at each of the 35 state adult correctional institutions across California. Services span the full spectrum of art disciplines, with organizations offering instruction in visual; literary; media; performing; and cultural, folk and traditional arts.

What's in a name?

Background

Language is powerful. It shapes our world. The CAC's AIC program is undergoing a significant period of growth and change, prioritizing efforts to break down barriers, challenge the status quo and create a culture shift within prison arts programming, words included.

Since 2018, the CAC has participated in the Government Alliance on Race and Equity, an initiative of the State urging public agencies to honor their responsibility of serving all people by actively working to repair the harm perpetuated by government through the implementation of equitable policies.

Because we believe that words have power, we know now more than ever it is time to change the Arts in Corrections program name to something new—something that reflects the positive impact the arts have on *you*.

The goal of the name change is to refocus the public's negative perception of people like you by highlighting your experiences with the arts, your transformation and healing journey—but above all, your humanity.

With this in mind, we have engaged prison arts organizations, artists, and members of the

community to provide us with their ideas for a new program name and we have received over 200 suggestions!

We've narrowed down the final decision to the top five reoccurring ideas and concepts—which you'll find included in the survey provided.
